# EQUINE NATURAL DISASTER EMERGENCY INFORMATION

## PLANNING AND PREPARATION FOR WILDFIRES

- •Remove dead wood, dead brush on your property; keep trees pruned, remove tallgrass/ weeds around barn structures, trailers and equipment
- Store hay, shavings away from the stable as well as gasoline & other flammable materials
- •Keep hoses attached to faucets at all times
- •Have plenty of leather halters, lead ropes at hand--be aware fire melts nylon halters
- •Keep trailers maintained & ready to use
- •Keep a fire extinguisher and field sprayer nearby in case a fire breaks out; maintain equipment
- •Have a Fire Safety & Evacuation Plan posted in your barn, review it with your helpers & boarders

- Condition your horses to seeing you with a bandana or goggles on your face
- •Take time to train all your horses to trailer load
- Post phone numbers of boarders
- •Post phone numbers of nearby veterinary hospitals, public large animal facilities & rescue groups to call about available space for your horses
- •Keep copies of current Coggins as rescue shelters may ask for one
- •Have 2 cell phone chargers: for your barn/car



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## WHAT TO DO IF YOU CAN'T EVACUATE DURING A WILDFIRE

- •Stock water: fill all available buckets, troughs, & containers with water to accommodate animals for 5-7 days
- Stock feed to last for 5-7 days
- •CLOSE barn/stall doors to prevent scared horses from running back inside and becoming trapped; open all gates to give horses freedom to run from fires
- •Remove horses from barns, put them in paddocks or under metal-constructed cover
- •Have horse identification information should you need to reclaim your horses from animal control
- •Mark your horses with your name, contact information; use duct tape & indelible markers & place the tape on your horses' neck or croup; or mark the information on your horses' hooves

- •Mark your property with placards placed on fence gates informing firefighters that animals are being sheltered on your property
- •Use gloves to protect your hands from burns
- Use a cotton bandana or goggles to protect your eyes from smoke & burning embers
- •Use a trash barrel with a lid-- fill it with a water bucket, lead rope, halter, crop, sheet or blanket, wraps, equine first aid items & other items you feel are essential to care for your horse(s)
- •Have a battery or solar powered radio to monitor news reports & emergency evacuation broadcasts
- •Keep your cell phone nearby & keep a charger in the car
- •Gather hand tools such as metal shovels & rakes to extinguish cinders that might fall onto your property
